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1. Brief Introduction of Department:

The English Department is one of the oldest in the college and was established in 1967, the year of the establishment of the college. The English Honours course was introduced in 1988. Through its teaching of language and literature courses, the department has helped to mould young students into rational, critical individuals and responsible citizens. It has also helped students to improve their communication skills in a variety of arenas, and provided the means of a deeper engagement with the world.

The English Department has a strong tradition of deep engagement with pedagogy, both in lecture classes as well as smaller tutorial groups. Teachers are constantly updating themselves by participating in research and development programmes. Meaningful classroom interactions with students are further enhanced through close academic and personal mentoring. Students consult with teachers on how to improve their academic performance and how to explore avenues for further professional development.

The English Literary Society, Mitrakshar, organizes talks, student seminars and workshops, inviting eminent scholars and teachers from other institutions, in order to foster a greater understanding of the curriculum. It also provides a platform for students to hone their organizational abilities.

The study of English as a major discipline enhances the interpretive and expressive skills of students. It equips students with both a rigorous knowledge of the subject as well as critical and analytical abilities. With an emphasis on an interdisciplinary approach, it stimulates and enhances originality. The study of English as a minor subject is also helpful in broadening the understanding of socio-political contexts and sharpening language skills.

The Generic Elective Course in English is a much sought-after course, with students being provided with necessary linguistic and soft skills, critical tools, and the scope for improving their writing for academic purposes as well as their understanding of socio-political and historical contexts.

2. Scope of the Subject:

The study of English as a major discipline

- teaches them the reading of not only British literature but also of World literatures (including Indian Literature in English translation, European Literature etc.)

- stimulates and enhances original and creative thinking through an emphasis on interdisciplinarity

- encourages nuanced questioning to boost a cosmopolitan understanding of life
- sharpens their language skills
- improves their soft skills
- enhances their critical tools
- boosts their skills in writing for academic purposes
