ABOUT THE SOCIETY






DR. SHANUJA BERI

He is also a Fellow of the International Association of Stem Cell Research. His research interests include Neuroinformatics and Stem Cell Biology, with expertise in molecular chaperones and ubiquitin E3 ligases in neurodegenerative disorders, and the therapeutic effects of biomolecules in aged neurons and muscles. Dr. Jha has authored over 150 peer-reviewed articles in high-impact journals like Molecular Cancer, Seminars in Cancer Biology, Journal of Controlled Release, Ageing Research Reviews, among others (h-index: 28; i10-index: 78; cumulative impact factor: 1100; citations: 3200). He holds more than ten patents and has published a book with Springer International Publishing. He received the 'Commendable Research Excellence Award' from DTU in 2018 and the 'Best Stem Cell Researcher Award 2019' from Prof. (Dr.) Michele Zocchi, University of Turin, Italy. He has presented over 20 papers at international symposiums and designed two new courses—Stem Cell Technology and Regenerative Medicine and Genetic Engineering—for B.Tech/M.Sc./PGD levels at Sharda University. He also has an outstanding record in teaching, research, and placements at the undergraduate and postgraduate levels in Biotechnology.


DR. PRIYANKA DAHIYA




MRS. SHIKHA RANI







FOLDSCOPE WORKSHOP

On 4th March 2025, an engaging and educational workshop was conducted by Dr. Rishikesh Krishan Laxmi and Dr. Joni Yadav on the innovative Foldscope microscope. The session aimed to introduce students and teachers to the low-cost, paper-based microscope known for revolutionizing access to science and microscopy, especially in resource-limited settings. Dr. Rishikesh and Dr. Yadav began the workshop with a brief history of the Foldscope's invention, highlighting its development as an affordable and portable tool that brings microscopy to classrooms and fieldwork. Participants were guided through the assembly process of the Foldscope and trained on its usage for observing microscopic samples such as plant cells, fibers, and microorganisms.

The hands-on session allowed students to explore a microscopic world using their own Foldscopes, sparking curiosity and enthusiasm for science. The facilitators also demonstrated how the Foldscope can be connected to smartphones for imaging and documentation, bridging traditional and modern techniques. The workshop was well-received by all attendees, with active participation and numerous questions that reflected a keen interest in scientific exploration. It successfully promoted experiential learning and emphasized the importance of accessible scientific tools in education, inspiring students to pursue further inquiry into the microscopic world around them.

On 7th April 2025, our esteemed faculty members, Dr. M. Rojina Devi and Mr. Gulshan Yadav, embarked on an insightful academic field visit to Kamla Nehru Ridge, Delhi. Organized under the expert guidance of Mr. Harmeek Singh – a renowned Field Biologist with the Biodiversity Parks Programme, CEMDE, University of Delhi. The visit aimed at collecting critical data for biostatistics research, while simultaneously deepening the understanding of urban ecology.

Throughout the visit, Mr. Harmeek Singh provided a comprehensive overview of the Ridge's rich biodiversity, the ecological restoration efforts underway, and its crucial role in sustaining Delhi's environmental health. He also shared fascinating insights into the historical evolution of the Ridge, highlighting its cultural and ecological importance as one of the city's oldest green spaces. The discussions delved into the challenges posed by invasive species and the ongoing strategies to restore native habitats. A special highlight of the visit was a tour of the Butterfly Conservatory, where the team observed conservation practices focused on pollinator species vital to urban ecosystems.

Overall, the visit proved to be a truly enriching experience – blending practical exposure, research-oriented learning, and a renewed appreciation for the vital role of biodiversity parks in urban sustainability.


MY LIFE AS A GREAT INDIAN BUSTARD
