- **Digital Display boards:** There is a digital display board at the entrance of the College's Administrative building that is used to flash important information as and how it is required.
- E-mail Id at Kalindi domain: The College administration has a Unique email domain at: kalindi.du.ac.in along with email id: kalindisampark.du@gmail.com, which routinely uses it to pass on important information to both teachers and non-teaching members. This facility greatly reduces the use of paper in the campus and is an important move towards digitalisation.
- **Bulk SMS facility:** At times the College administration communicates with staff members and students via a bulk SMS facility which ensures that the relevant information gets passed on to all staff members in a short span of time.
- Student Management Software: This software manages data concerning admissions,

attendance, timetable, compiled internal assessment, results etc.

- Salaries, attendance, pension etc. are fully automated and the systems are well connected.
- Latest software to collect feedback of all the stakeholders is under process.
- The college is well connected with university portal to manage Admission and Examination fee.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- Various Faculty members from the College have contributed for Curriculum development whether it is restructuring the courses for FYUP or CBCS. (As per University Norms; Committee of Courses)
- Faculty members routinely attend Departmental meetings held in the University by the Parent Departments and Faculty Development Programmes for curriculum development /modifications. The college supports by providing duty leave for the same and all faculty members can avail this leave as and how it is required.
- The scope of curriculum prescribed by University is further strengthened by: Promoting research into associated and peripheral areas
- Organising talks, seminars, conferences, workshops. E-presentations by both experts and students, which explore the limits of prescribed syllabus and contribute to curriculum development.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- The college has been Central Evaluation Centre (CEC) for B.Com. (P), Non Collegiate Women's Education Board (NCWEB) and School of Open Learning (SOL) courses since 2016-17. Evaluation is also carried out for the AECC and SEC courses within the College itself. A designated coordinator is appointed for each AECC and SEC evaluation. These coordinators oversee that proper disbursal and marking of the answer scripts and uploading of the marks on the University portal is carried out in the designated time frame. Infrastructural facility is provided to both centers and coordinators are appointed to ensure their smooth functioning.
- Every year one department is allotted the duty to conduct the semester end exams. Invigilation duties are given to all faculty members of the College. The required number of non-teaching staff members are also allotted duties to ensure smooth conduction of the theory exams. The Principal and Administrative Officer are available at all times to ensure that the process is carried out without any glitches.
- The Science/Commerce/Mathematics/Geography/B.Voc. Departments also conduct their practical examinations of various honours and programme courses running in the college as per university guidelines and in the designated time slot. Duties are given to each

faculty member of the Department as internal examiners, superintendent and invigilators. They are also appointed as external examiners in other colleges.

• The College also conducts the NCWEB and SOL examinations during the end of the II, IV and VI semesters; and also conducts various competitive examinations.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- The College Library has 78293 books, 1898 reference books and subscribe 75 journals and newspapers.
- The automation process of the library system has also been fully completed. All books in Library are bar coded and can be easily tracked through Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC). All the academic journals can be accessed and obtained online via the university networking system.
- Barcoded cards have been issued to students and staff.
- All teachers and students have been provided separate login IDs to have access INFLIBNET e-journals within college campus.
- The library has collection of syllabi and earlier years University question papers.
- Periodic Review Visits and frequent checks of CCTV footage are conducted to ensure proper utilization of Library, ICT and physical infrastructure.
- Apart from the main college library, there exist departmental libraries, managed by the department itself for the ease of access to subject specific books by the students and teachers. Both students and teachers routinely donate books to these libraries.
- Initiatives have been started to make the College campus cashless. The accounts section has already stopped disbursing any payments in cash and mostly all payments are being done by NEFT.
- The college has undertaken steps to improve the existing infrastructure. The Sangam Parisar has been handed over to PWD for renovation and overhauling. Construction of the girls' hostel for North East students by PWD is in progress.
- Well-equipped laboratory for B.Voc. Web Designing has been added during the academic year.
- Instruments have been added in various departments from funding received for research projects. (Refer to Annexure IV.1 and IV.2)
- Laptops are provided to students and staff.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The College takes utmost care to manage its human resource efficiently and carefully. The roles, responsibilities, interests and rights of staff and students are respected and protected within the purview of the rules. In addition to remuneration, leaves and privileges; significance is given to welfare and development of staff and students. Following steps

have been taken to manage the human resource:

- All appointments are done after calculation of workload and strictly in accordance with UGC/University rules.
- Personal files and data are well recorded and maintained.
- Bio-metric attendance system ensures regularity and fair assessment of non-teaching staff
- All leave rules as per the University on Delhi are followed.
- For up-gradation and training, duty leave is provided to respective teaching and non-teaching staff members (Refer to Criterion 2)
- The practice of work allocation among teaching and non-teaching is a regular practice that demonstrates multi-tasking competence of the staff. For effective functioning departments, administration, laboratories, events, festivals, etc. duties are disbursed among staff and students. There is usually a main organizing committee and the subcommittees report into the main organizing committee. This ensures that work is evenly distributed and carried out in an efficient manner.
- On open door policy to listen to grievances and problems of employees and students is followed and efforts are made to redress the same promptly.
- Periodic General Assemblies of students; and various Complaint Boxes affixed outside Principal's Room, Canteen and Library; provide platforms for ventilation of students' grievances that are redressed by Grievance Cell, Proctorial Board, ICC and other channels.
- Frequent meetings are held with different stakeholders for free flow of interaction.
- Several welfare schemes have been floated for teaching, non-teaching staff and the students (Refer to Criterion VI.4)
- Review Visits are conducted by the IQAC to ensure proper working of the system.
- The superannuation benefits are also provided promptly and regularly. All financial dues of retired teaching and non-teaching staff members are settled on their last working day
- College continues to provide medical reimbursement etc. as per University guidelines. (Details available in Accounts Section)

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

- All recruitments are done as per the sanctioned strength and approval of the funding agency.
- The College strictly adheres to the University of Delhi guidelines for the making and implementation of the teaching and non-teaching roster and for calculation of the workload for each of the departments.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

To expand the horizon, to extend facilities, to promote the research acumen, and to enhance the employability and job opportunities of the students, the College has extended interaction and collaboration with various institutions. For this purpose, following Memorandums of Understanding (MoU) were signed between the College and institutions/industries:

- **Department of Journalism:** Industry interactions are done through field experts from various organisations. There have been interactive sessions for students by Mr. Kumar Kunal (Aaj Tak), Mr. Rohit Vats (Hindustan Times), Mr. Tripathi (Telerad) and many more. The department is currently in the process of collaboration with media organisations by working on the modalities of the MoU.
- The Placement & Career Counselling Committee: This committee has organised interaction with industries to encourage placement and career counselling for students.
- **B.Voc:** M/s Dainik Jagran, Noida is industry partner for B.Voc. (Printing Technology) and M/s Sisoft Technology Pvt. Ltd. is industry partner for B.Voc (Web Designing).
- NSS and IIT Delhi: NSS unit of the College signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with IIT Delhi for the Indian Road Safety Campaign (IRSC), a National Project with the maxim to inculcate significant Road Safety and prohibit catastrophes on roads.
- R.K. Films & Media Academy: MoU signed with R K Films & Media Academy (RKFMA) for Add-on Courses on "Video Production" and "Photo Journalism"
- Englitude Academics: MoU signed with Englitude Academics for Add-on Course on Communication Skills & Personality Development.
- **IBSD Kalindi College:** Kalindi College signed a Memorandum of understanding (MOU) with Institute of Bioresources and Sustainable Development, Imphal, Manipur, to set up an IBSD-Kalindi Centre for Women Entrepreneurship in North East at Kalindi College.
- Kalindi College and Hero Solar Energy: MoUs signed with Hero Solar Energy Pvt Ltd. for Solar Photovoltaic Power Plant for harnessing solar energy to fulfil the electricity needs of the College and to ultimately move towards self-sufficiency in power production.

6.14 Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly

The College is continuously making efforts to make the campus eco-friendly and in the process, promotes various initiatives like:-

- Paper recycling unit: there is a functional paper recycling unit near the College Canteen that is managed and run by the Eco Club of the College. This unit accumulates waste paper from various departments and recycles them to make recycled paper. Training is also provided to students in how to recycle waste paper. (Details in Annexure 7.4.1)
- Vermicompost plant: A vermicompost pit is present in the Herbal Garden that effectively uses organic plant waste to produce manure that is then used in the College gardens.

- Green Campus: the College strives towards a green campus. A number of initiatives are taken by the Eco Club to promote awareness among students.
- The College has signed an MoU for installing solar panels on campus so that we can shift to green energy sources.
- On the occasion of the "International Ozone Day" i.e. 16th September, students from our College also attended the celebrations and were educated about the importance of Ozone layer protection and its utility in maintaining the environment free of pollution.
- Energy efficient bulbs and tubes are in use in the College campus and students are constantly instructed to turn off lights and other electronic devices when not in use. There are notices in each classroom that instruct the students and staff to switch off lights and fans when the classes are over so as to save electricity.
- The installation of a central Reverse Osmosis plant has also been initiated during this academic session that will be functional in the next academic year. It will provide clean drinking water for all students and staff and discourage the buying of plastic water bottles in and around campus.
- The campus is a Tobacco Free Zone, there is no availability of tobacco products around the Campus and various campaigns are organized to create awareness about the drawbacks and health hazards of tobacco use.
- Notices for students before Diwali & Holi to not play with firecrackers and colors were displayed and an Anti-firecracker campaign programme was organized for awareness.

Institutional Repository has been created as archives for collecting, preserving, and disseminating digital copies of intellectual output of the college.

- Research Projects (In-house): The College created a Research Corpus and allocated seed money for research at undergraduate level. For each project, faculty members and students from every department were encouraged to submit their proposal. With due approval from the Governing Body of the College, these projects were finally allocated to various departments.
- **B.R. Ambedkar Study Center:** Commemorating the 52nd *Mahaparinirvan Diwas* of Babasahab, the Dr. B. R. Ambedkar Study Centre was inaugurated at College, on 6th December 2017. The Centre is committed towards preserving and propagating the vision and mission of Dr. Bhim Rao Ambedkar. A two-day National Seminar on "Dr. Ambedkar on Women's Rights in India: Issues and Prospects" in collaboration with Dr. Ambedkar Chair in Social Justice, Indian Institute of Public Administration (IIPA), was organized by the Centre on 6th and 7th December, 2017.
- **Stakeholder Feedback:** The College has an established mechanism for obtaining feedback from all stakeholders including students, faculty, parents and alumni. In addition to the existing framework, the feedback from non-teaching staff was initiated in 2017-18,
- Internship Fair: On 27th February 2018, the Placement Cell organized its first ever mega event, The Internship Fair 2018 where 20 companies like Sharekhan, VQMS and NGOs like Youwecan, Upay were invited. More than 250 students including students from other DU colleges participated in the internship fair. The Internship Fair observed over 490 online and offline registrations by the enthusiastic students.
- **Girls Hostel:** The construction of North East Girls Hostel was initiated by Public Works Department. Expected to be completed by next academic session, it would provide additional infrastructure and facilities to outstation students in general and North-eastern students in particular.

II. Community Outreach: Reinforcing Institutional Social Responsibility by developing feasible solutions for communities' upliftment

1. Title of the Project: Project REHMAT

Project REHMAT aims to create a nation where a person does not die for a living. Manual scavengers remove human and animal excreta from streets and dry latrine, cleaning septic tanks, sewers and gutters across the nation. This inhuman occupation has been banned by the constitution for the past 13 years but it is still being practiced on a large scale. Are the sacrifices of these cleaning soldiers less than those at the borders? To protect these cleaning soldiers of our nation we came up with our project REHMAT. The vision of project REHMAT is to completely rehabilitate manual scavengers and making entrepreneurs in their community providing them a life of dignity.

2. Title of the Project: Collaboration with Connecting Dreams Foundation (CDF)

Kalindi College collaborated with CDF in April 2017 and various projects have been undertaken. The first project was '**Dream Key Library**' wherein a library was established in Khalsa School, R.K. Ashram Marg.

The second project was 'Kilkari', with an objective to make every child compatible enough to be able to read and write in slum cluster areas and tries to ensure hundred percent literacy rate.

The third project 'Masoom' was initiated with the objective of spending some time with the specially abled community and work towards their welfare and development. (Refer to Annexure 7.3.3)

7.4 Contribution to environmental awareness / protection

• Solar System: The College has undertaken this project on the open roof top, in consultation with the Govt of NCT of Delhi. The project has been undertaken by Hero Solar Energy Pvt. Ltd, New Delhi, under the project name "61.75 KWp Grid Connected Solar Power Plant at Kalindi College", which has been installed under IPGCL Scheme. The design, supply, installation, commissioning, operation and maintenance is being done by Hero Solar Energy Pvt Ltd.

The project is successfully generating 61 KWp in the college. The MoU has been signed for 25 Years. This has reduced the power consumption in the college to a great extent.

• Maintaining Greenery in Campus:

- o Kalindi College has put in efforts to transform every untouched nook and corner into green areas through the myriad shades of colour of plants and flowers.
- o College has been honoured by the "Letter of appreciation for maintaining the maximum greenery in the college" during the 60th Annual Flower Show organized by University of Delhi.
- o Mr. Munna, gardener, Kalindi College, received 'Best Mali of the college Award' in the Flower Show.
- o Among many new additions of various plant species in our herbal garden, few are native of Northeastern parts of India.
- o The Garden Album titled "Ode to the Plants we live with" was released on 1st January, 2018 featuring beautiful photographs along with some interesting quotes and descriptive illustrations of all the gardens as well as green areas of the college.

• The living wall; Vertical Garden Project:

The vertical garden bottle system project is a helping steps towards awareness and restriction people for creating plastic waste. The vertical garden bottle system project used all the waste bottles to create vertical base to grow plant along the wall of buildings. The green vertical wall will increase the green surface area of the College and hence it will be a great initiative taken by the College to make the Campus eco-Friendly.

• Enhancing students' environmental awareness

 - ✓ The biochemical society organised Two day educational trip to Mahatma Gandhi Institute for Combating Climate Change to attend a workshop on climate change on 16th and 24th October 2017, for first, second and third year students of B.Sc. Life Science.
 - ✓ Prof. K.G. Sexana, from JNU on Basic Science of Climate Change and Challanges of climate Change, Delhi and Dr. J.P. Kesari, Associate Professor, DTU on Solar energy for Environmental Sustainability and development delivered informative lectures and hands-on training in the workshop conducted by Dr. Ravinder Palakurthy, Faculty and Director (Admin), MGICCC.
 - o World Wetland Day and visit to Indira Paryavaran Bhawan:

- ✓ Ist year Students of B.Sc. (Hons) Zoology and faculty members of the Department of Zoology visited office/residence of the Minister for Environment, Dr Harsh Vardhan On 2nd February 2018 to celebrate **World Wetland Day**.
- ✓ The ministry had organized an exhibition cum inauguration of the Dr Harsh Vardhan App by the Minister for Environment for initiating good green deeds.
- ✓ Students and faculties visited Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change (MoEFCC), Indira Paryavaran Bhawan and explored different self-sustaining system of that building viz optimal use of solar panels, Geo thermal heat exchange system, terrace garden, automated robotic car parking system etc.
- Visit to Biodiversity Park: The Zoology Department organized two educational trips for First year students of B.Sc. (H) Zoology (60 students) and Physics (30 students) for Environmental studies (compulsory and qualifying) paper during academic session 2017- 2018. One day trip for B.Sc. (H) Zoology (60 students) and Physics (30 students) on 30th and 31st October 2017 respectively to Aravalli Biodiversity Park, Delhi.
- World water day: Eco-Club observed 'World Water Day' on 22nd March 2018 by organizing a lecture series on 'Water Treatment and Water Quality'. The Keynote speakers Prof. Haseena Hashia from Jamia Millia Islamia and Prof. S.C.Rai, from Department of Geography, Delhi University, delivered lectures on the theme "Sustainability issues of Water Resource". Also Dr. K. Lal Babu, Scientist from National Water Commission, Ministry of water resource delivered a lecture on "Impact of Climate Change on Water Resources".

STRENGTHS:-

- Large number of courses from all streams sciences, technology, humanities, commerce and vocational:
- Located in the heart of city, close to Rajendra Palace Metro station and bus stand which connects it to all parts of Delhi and the neighbouring states;
- Eminent and experienced academicians and administrators as members of the Governing Body:
- Culturally diverse student community from Delhi as well as from other parts of India;
- Cordial and harmonious management and Staff relationship;
- Qualified, competent and research oriented faculty members;
- Green campus area ornamented with eight beautiful gardens;

- Teaching and learning integrated with curricular and co-curricular activities aiming at holistic development of students;
- Participatory and interactive learning techniques, continuous evaluation and identification of slow and advance learners;
- Continuous upgradation of laboratories and other infrastructural amenities;
- Add-on/Certificate skill based courses providing opportunities for vocational and professional growth.
- Extension activities and community outreach programmes;
- An active Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) engaged in the monitoring, augmentation and sustenance of the overall quality of the College.
- Major and minor research projects undertaken by the faculty and promotion of research at undergraduate level.
- Disabled friendly College campus;
- A robust feedback system involving all stake holders;
- Cashless transactions.

WEAKNESSES:-

- Inadequate teaching and research space;
- More than fifty years old school building continues to be main academic block, and the structure is not strong enough to support major extensions in the building (if undertaken);
- Paucity of reading space in Library;
- Due to ongoing construction of Girls Hostel, unavailability of sports ground for outdoor sports.
- Small Laboratories to accommodate large number of students;
- Densely populated surroundings pose traffic, parking and security related issues for girl students;
- Insufficient sitting area in canteen;
- Encroachment in college premises.

OPPORTUNITIES: -

- With completion of under-construction North-eastern Girls Hostel, the College would attract more number of students from other state/countries;
- Integrated Programs with industry-collaborations would be more beneficial;
- More Value Added Courses would provide additional professional opportunities;
- The consultancy service and entrepreneurial skill development programme can add to the financial resources of the institution and practical experience of faculty and students;
- The industry-academia collaboration will increase the job opportunities for the students;
- Alumnae association will enable student internships, placements and additional resources;
- Designing/ creation of e-content, subject related videos, animations and online courses, may supplement the conventional teaching methodology.
- Creation of extensive sports facilities in the College can provide opportunities for students to excel at national and international level.

- The Media Coverage and Social Media preference of various college activities can further enhance the popularity of the College.
- College can open more short term skill oriented courses which can provide early employment to the students.

THREATS & CHALLENGES:-

- Availability and generation of financial resources is often a constraint in the expansion of infrastructure and facilities.
- Limited research facilities and time constrains in the semester system.
- Coping with the requirements of advanced Library resources.
- Introduction of any new academic programme is restricted due to limited resources and infrastructure.
- The inadequate permanent faculty is a major constrain in running the academic practices smoothly;

Establishment of various government, grant-in-aid, autonomous colleges and deemed universities with Professional and Job oriented courses as well as advanced facilities and resources within the vicinity of the institution poses a challenge to the College to expand vertically as well as horizontally.
