The College has a well-planned mechanism for the effective delivery of the curriculum and its documentation, the plan can be divided into the following : A) Department meeting: The College follow the SoP for the conduct of meetingstimely notification, meeting register, meeting attendance, circulation of minutes of the meeting to the members and finalization of previous minutes of meeting in the upcoming meeting. The departmental meeting are generally focus on- syllabus, curriculum planning, time table and distribution of course among the teaching faculty. Any co-curricular activities are also part of such meetings. B) Individual faculty curriculum plan: Faculty take all the efforts to engage the students to their best of ability- in terms of curriculum planning and dedicate to complete the offered syllabus in stipulated time line. C) Academic calendar: Kalindi College is in direct sync with University of Delhi, Academic Calender. The college adhere strictly with the opening, teaching schedule, session breaks and examination schedule of University of Delhi. The College/teachers take an extra mile to engage the students with the house examination so that they are well prepared for the semester end examinations. D)Department Meeting with Principal and IQAC: The department/teachers make every effort to enhance the teaching ability to suite the interest of the dynamic student mindset through innovating teaching ideas. The role of teachers' discussion among themselves is critical for the samethis is enabled through time to time IQAC sessions and with the guidance of Principal. E) Department Result Analysis Meetings with Principal and IQAC: Comprehensive discussions in consultation with the Principal are conducted by the TICs with the respective faculty members on how to address the issue of slow learners in the course. This excercise enables to design a mechanism to enhance the potential of such students. F) Teaching Pedagogy: Innovation in course contents is carried out by including contemporary teaching concepts, ICT presentation, field excursion, internal assignments in addition to chalk & boards engagements. Besides standard books suggested in Course Syllabus, the students are provided with handouts of teaching presentations and reviews. Dialogue based approach of teaching instead of monologue. Promoting debate on a topic in classroom. Mentoring of students to learn and deliver presentations on topics relevant to the paper taught on a particular topic. Bilingual teaching is practiced to involve students from different background and to encourage confidence among the students. Anonymous feedback on class room teaching.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

#### Feedback Obtained

Feedback is vital part of improving the existing facilities provided by the college and teaching and learning process. It helps the institute and the mentor to recognize that how the students consider about the facilities provided by the college and know her subject being taught. This is a significant parameter where the institute and teacher can get better his/her teaching methodology that will finally benefit the student. With this aim the college has developed following feedback systems. The feedback's are collected from the all stakeholders (Students, Alumini, Parents and Teachers) by the IQAC through feedback committee and analysed. College has introduced online feedback system. Exhaustive reports are prepared and are communicated to concern teaching staff and department head for their improvement. The report of the same are also uploaded on the college website. Students' Feedback: Students deserve to understand and enjoy rich learning environments which entail creating meaningful formal developments and other opportunities for teachers to improve more and implement practices that nurture cultures of learning for students. To fullfill this criteria the College take online/offline feedback to all students (informed properly) and collect the data by the separate committee and submitted to concerned authority for the feed back to be used for improving the teaching learning pedogogy and infrastucture facility. Teachers' Feedback: The college has created an online mechanism where individual faculty can fill the feedback about the college infrastructure and facilities provided viz. innovative aids, technological support (projectors, teaching aids, models etc.), research facilities, lecture room cleaniless, laboratories, basic ammenties, canteen, food quality, hygiene etc. Along with this he/she has also an option of providing their own innovations in the teaching learning process and infra developments. Parents' Feedback: The College has devised a mechanism where Parent's Teacher's Student's would meet and discuss various college related issues at a common platform. The objective of PTSI is to (i) provide parents the opportunity to comment on the quality of their ward's learning experience, as required in preparation for and as part of review process (ii) assess the success of academic provision in relation to the expectations of both the parents and the students (iii) provide feedback to the faculties in order to improve delivery and/or content of the curriculum. Every effort is made by the college for informing the parents prior through SMS. Such PTSI are scheduled twice a year. Alumni Feedback: Kalindi College Alumni Association provide a platform for students who have graduated from this college to stay in

touch with each other and their alma mater. We treasure all our students - current ones as well as the alumni. Feedback from Alumini allows the institute to evaluate how its service provision is viewed by its one of the most important stakeholders i.e. students. To fullfill this criteria the College take online/offline feedback to all Alumini students (informed properly) and collect the data by the separate committee and submitted to the competent authority for further action.

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2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The College has developed mentoring system, where faculty members (mentor) have been assigned a group of students (mentee) of their respective departments and keeping their records. Usually, mentoring is done to discuss problems of the students, which may fall under categories such as 1) Academic: Students coming from different boards/language regions face expression lacunae. They also don't know how to organize their time and respond (in class) in effective way. Some students face challenges in communicating to their fellow students and staff. Mentors guide them on such academic issues through informal discussions. 2) Peer pressure: Mentoring is an encompassing process in which the faculty members serve as a guide in the personal grooming of students facing isolation due to their diverse social/economic backgrounds. 3) Immature mind sets, various fears: Mentors encourage the students who face examination fear in terms of their performance and responsibility back home 4)Career counsellor/motivator: Mentors aware the students about various career avenues available to them according to their courses and interest. They also update the students regarding various workshops, lectures, competition and other related activities, and motivate them to participate in the same. 5) Personal problems: Mentors as a friend resolve their psychological, medical and personal issues leading to their underperformance. Some of the outstation students face home sickness, where mentors help them and connect them to likeminded students. 6) Grooming of advanced learners: Mentors offer them opportunities to show off their knowledge by involving them in activities that offer an allround approach.

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#### 2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

1. Kalindi College is part of University of Delhi, which under CBCS assigns 25 marks to Continuous Internal Evaluation for theory part of Core and DSE papers. Out of these 25 marks, 5 marks are for attendance, 10 for House Exam and 10 for assignment. 2. In our Institution, attendance of students is regularly monitored and uploaded on website, which is visible to students and parents. Letters are sent to parents of students with short of attendance around home exams. 3. For 10 marks of House Exam, our Institution conduct house examinations immediately after midsemester break in both semesters, exactly on the same pattern as the semester end university examination. Medical and genuine reasons are also considered by the Principal for rescheduling the home exam. 4. It is mandatory to cover at least 60 of syllabus in house examination. Evaluated answer scripts are returned to students for discussion about their performance. This provides a good exposure of examination pattern to the students and helps them to prepares well in advance. 5. For Assignments, different departments opt for written/problem solving based exercises, presentations with vivavoice etc., which gives the students a free hand to showcase their intelligence and creativity. 6. For lab papers, students are regularly monitored in terms of consistency in performance regarding allotment, checking of auxiliary and fair practical files. All dates are recorded in practical allotment registers and regularly reviewed. At the end, they have to give mock exam and power point presentations with viva. 7. All these evaluations are included to decide internal assessment marks of lab papers

The available resources are either procured through proper channel or allocated to departments if available. All laboratory equipment's like Oscilloscope, Function Generators, Conductometer, Potentiometer, Spectrophotometer, Water Bath, Digital Storage and sensitive electronic instruments are checked and verified at the end of academic semester by staff, lab assistants and lab attendants. The Biology Laboratories, including Botany and Zoology museums, are maintained through weekly observations and specimens, crafts and models are conserved at the same frequency. The repairing and maintenance of microscopes and other equipment is done in each semester. The College has two full time caretakers. Students are empowered to play an active role as a coordinator of cocurricular activities and extracurricular activities, social service coordinator. Office members are involved in executing day to day support services for both students and faculties. During the year 201819, college organized cultural fest and delegated power to the teaching staff, nonteaching Staff and students to mobilize the resources in the annual Cultural Fest of the college 201819. (ANNEXURE: 1) Every Department has societies in which academic fests are organized by the teachers and students both. The academic fest at the department level is discussed by the HOD with the faculty team in consultation with the principal. Student union is also assigned duties regarding grievances of the students during the time of admissions. A) The Living Green Wall of College - An Educational exposition of Bottle Vertical Garden System: A.1) Kalindi College uniting plastic waste management with vertical garden system techniques. A.2) Students learnt about effective waste management and helped them to set up a similar wall garden at their homes. A.3) The green vertical wall increased the green surface area of the college. B) Energy conservation by solar system: College has undertaken this project on the open roof top. Project is successfully generating 61 KWp in the College. An MoU has been signed for 25 Years. The programme included a two day interactive session on 15 16 January 2019 and a one day Industrial visit to a NIESBUD incubation centre KRAFTIVITY at Narayana, Delhi was conducted on 23rd January 2019, where the experts gave an insight to students how they can open their own small business or incubation centre. They also demonstrated a bakery session with students and taught our students to how to make muffins. They were also informed about various short term and cost effective courses in bakery and cosmetics. An incubation centre with the theme An Initiative through Natural Remedies was started with a theme of growing and selling air purifying plants (Aloe vera, Areca Palm, Money plant, Tulsi). The main purpose to start this incubation centre is to encourage and to enable our students to get firsthand experience in entrepreneurship and

also to create awareness towards green and clean environment and also to acquaint the society about air purifying and medicinal plants which are beneficial to lower the environmental pollution and enhance health status. It would also provide comprehensive and integrated platform with multifaceted support including space, mentoring, training programs, networking and an array of other benefits. B) Social Responsibility: In 2018, Project named WERAN aimed at the upliftment of farming community by educating them about the new and organic farming practices which they weren't aware about. Also, it aimed at increasing their incomes by making them aware feasible farming practices and alert them about the vicious cycle of intermediaries or middlemen. The farming women were engaged in the business of making pickles and jams. Connecting Dreams Foundation (CDF), Kalindi College chapter, expanded Project KILKARI. The advance module was introduced in addition to the Base 1 syllabus in the Sewa Bharti centres of Todapur and Inderpuri. Team Kilkari made the kids science friendly. A variety of science experiments like making a water filter, hot air burning experiment were conducted in the centres. A Solar System model was taught to the kids by assigning each child a role of a planet that revolves around sun. This little act helped them to understand how planets revolve around sun and celestial bodies in the solar system. Project Unnati was able to feed nutritious food to at least 500 people and women was employed to work as chef in the Unnati Bhojanalaya.
