Passage 1 (634 words)

We live in a fast-paced world with the constant need for movement to various destinations, which warrants the use of motor vehicles for fast and convenient transport. From ancient times, vehicles powered by energy from hydro-carbon sources have been used to meet the need for locomotion. Incidentally, fossil fuel is non-renewable, has fluctuating prices, and pollutes the environment. This has prompted the emergence of alternative sources of power for motor vehicles, which are fairly eco-friendly and relatively cheap. For the most part, electric cars offer a near-perfect answer to this dilemma. Nevertheless, like all man made machines, electric cars have some disadvantages.

Electric cars are motor vehicles whose engines are powered by electricity, unlike vehicles with internal combustion engines which use fuel. There are three types: those that are powered explicitly by external electric sources, those that have rechargeable batteries, and those that have built-in generators to provide power for thrust. Furthermore, electric cars are not necessarily powered by electricity generated by fossil fuels. Renewable sources of energy like solar and wind can also be used to generate electricity for propulsion.

The most noteworthy attribute of electric cars is their eco-friendliness. They boast of having zero emissions of carbon dioxide, thus minimal environmental pollution. This is contrary to cars with internal combustion

engines, which emit close to 20% of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere. Furthermore, it is cheaper to operate an electric car compared to a conventional car, because it is cheaper to charge a car battery than refuel a tank. Additionally, electric car owners are accorded various privileges, like parking fee waivers in public places, due to the eco-friendly nature of their cars.

Moreover, electric cars lose just about around 10% of their energy through heat, which makes them energy efficient compared to their conventional counterparts that lose up to 80% of their energy (Schools 163). On the same note, electric cars have silent engines thus they produce minimal noise compared to conventional cars, which produce irritating noise. In addition, since electric cars can be powered by energy from innumerable sources, including renewable sources, the depletion of fossil fuels cannot render them redundant.

Unfortunately, electric cars are not suited for long journeys and off-road excursions. This is because they have less torque and can only attain a maximum speed of 55 miles per hour, which is significantly lower than that of a normal car. In addition, electric cars are yet to be accorded the much-needed infrastructural support, like charging and servicing stations along

highways, to address contingencies that might crop up in the course of a journey. Most mechanics find electric vehicles paradoxical because they are a rarity, and interaction with them is limited to big cities.

Electric cars are also dependent on batteries that store charge which can only supply enough power for a limited number of hours. As a result, a full tank of a conventional car can give a driver more mileage than a fully charged battery of an electric car. In this regard, electric car owners have to operate within a given radius where they are confident of getting a power source and a service station. This confines them to established cities with the aforesaid facilities. In addition, since electric cars are noiseless they are prone to accidents because people with visual disabilities cannot hear them when approaching crossing zones. In this age of global warming and economic recessions that inflate the prices of virtually everything, the use of eco-friendly and cheaper sources of energy to power machines has become paramount. Furthermore, the public needs to be sensitized to the advantages of embracing technology that reduces greenhouse gas emissions. Moreover, there is a need to improve the speed of electric cars and the power retention capacity of batteries, to charm the users of conventional cars to switch to electric cars.

The sea has rolled far back today. The beach is wider, flatter, more empty, more washed. In the distance I see schoolchildren in brown uniforms, standing in rows. Three teachers are busy straightening out the lines. Most of these children are five and six years old. Some are older. All of them are happy. They laugh and talk with the excitement that belongs to children alone. I am closer to them now. The three teachers, two women and a man, are putting the last of the children into position. I walk up to the man. 'Why are you making the children stand in lines?' I ask. 'We are having a race,' he explains. 'Will you let them run around after the race is over?' He seems a little surprised. 'Yes,' he says, with a touch of impatience. I smile apologetically and move on.

A while later, I return. The races are in progress. I stand near the 'finishing post' and watch the two girls being readied for the next race. On your marks, get set, go! Arms flailing, the girls rush forward. The stronger of the two wins. Naturally. The children clap and cheer, the teachers smile their appreciation. The girl who has won laughs happily and runs back in triumph.

I look at the girl who has lost. In her eyes, I see shame. I see fear, I see despair. Shame at not being able to win, fear of what the others are thinking, despair at not knowing what to do next. I see the face of a child that has been hurt and humiliated. I see a soul that is slowly being bruised and brutalized by comparison: by being forced to compete with the physically stronger on the beaches and playgrounds. In the classrooms, the same game will continue. She will be compared to the more intelligent, the ones with better memories and those who can write faster than her.

The girl is still confused. She looks up at her teachers nervously. Something within her has withered. I want to tell her that she is beautiful and sensitive, that this race doesn't matter, that it's just a silly system that grownups invented for their own selfish reasons. I want to give her something to make her feel better.

In my hand I have an orange. Impulsively, I reach forward, take the hand of this child and put the orange into it. 'Take this,' I say to her. 'It's for coming second.'

At once I realize I have made a mistake. On her face I see shock, disbelief and more humiliation. She takes the orange, runs back and is lost among the lines of children.

Perhaps I chose the wrong words to say to her. Maybe the suddenness of the gesture startled her. But even if I had never come that way, that child would have wanted nothing more than to become a faceless girl in a line, not an object of ridicule, separate and alone. The races continue — I leave...

In an hour the sun will sink into the waterlined distance in a sizzling blaze of orange and red. Far away, sailing boats of the fishermen are now headed for the coast. I pause, turn back, making a fresh track of footprints. The tide too has turned and, in time, will erase all traces of my having walked this shore. A flock of sandpipers, flying low, wing their wanton way along the shifting edge of water, looking for pickings in freshly washed patches of sand.

The schoolchildren have gone away, the races are over. But others are filling the beach. Elderly couples walking with their dogs, enjoying the twilight of their lives. Girls, in secure clusters, preening themselves. Men walking vigorously, boys strolling aimlessly watching the girls in the distance.

The colour of animals is by no means a matter of chance; it depends on many considerations, but in the majority of cases tends to protect the animal from danger by rendering it less conspicuous. Perhaps it may be said that if colouring is mainly protective, there ought to be but few brightly coloured animals. There are, however, not a few cases in which vivid colours are themselves protective. The kingfisher itself, though so brightly coloured, is by no means easy to see. The blue harmonizes with the water, and the bird as it darts along the stream looks almost like a flash of sunlight.

Desert animals are generally the colour of the desert. Thus, for instance, the lion, the antelope, and the wild donkey are all sand-coloured. "Indeed," says Canon Tristram, "in the desert, where neither trees, brushwood, nor even undulation of the surface afford the slightest protection to its foes, a modification of colour assimilated to that of the surrounding country is absolutely necessary. Hence, without exception, the upper plumage of every bird, and also the fur of all the smaller mammals and the skin of all the snakes and lizards, is of one uniform sand colour."

The next point is the colour of the mature caterpillars, some of which are brown. This probably makes the caterpillar even more conspicuous among the green leaves than would otherwise be the case. Let us see, then, whether the habits of the insect will throw any light upon the riddle. What would you do if you were a big caterpillar? Why, like most other defenceless creatures, you would feed by night, and lie concealed by day. So do these caterpillars. When the morning light comes, they creep down the stem of the food plant, and lie concealed among the thick herbage and dry sticks and leaves, near the ground, and it is obvious that under such circumstances the brown colour really becomes a protection. It might indeed be argued that the caterpillars, having become brown, concealed themselves on the ground, and that we were reversing the state of things. But this is not so, because, while we may say as a general rule that large caterpillars feed by night and lie concealed by day, it is by no means always the case that they are brown, some of them still retaining the green colour. We may then conclude that the habit of concealing themselves by day came first, and that the brown colour is a later adaptation.

The discovery of coffee is lost in legend. Perhaps a thousand years ago, an Abyssinian (living in Eastern Africa) was attracted by the smell that came from a burning shrub. He chewed a few of its berries. Taken up by the aroma he brewed it. Thus was discovered coffee. The coffee bean is a seed, or a stone, of a fruit resembling a small cherry. It grows on a tall bush.

From Abyssinia it was taken to Arabia in the 15th century and then 200 years later spread to several tropical countries. The Dutch and the English colonisers distributed it across the world. It soon became a much sought after beverage in Europe and the Americas.

Three-fourth's of the world's coffee is produced in Brazil as the red soil, temperate climate, and high grounds with good drainage provide it with perfect conditions. Some coffee plantations extend for miles. Called 'facendas', these plantations produce over 50 million bags of coffee annually. Brazilian coffee is prized for beans that are processed by the dry method.

Climate change affects coffee plants in multitudes

through drought and frost. Moreover, many coffee processing plants often discharge waste into the rivers, creating pollution, contamination of the water, causing the death of aquatic plants and creatures. Yet, commercial agriculture wins as the market demands more coffee.

Coffee is also grown in large quantities in Venezuela, Colombia, Guatemala, countries in the West Indies and Uganda. Terms like Moca and Java no longer refer to the places where coffee comes from but merely a particular kind which is grown in different countries. Indonesia in Asia, and Ethiopia in Africa are major producers of coffee outside South and Central America.
