Allocation-cum-Admission schedule for Undergraduate admissions for the Academic Session 2024-25.

The schedule for allocation-cum-admission to all Undergraduate programs of all colleges of University of Delhi for the Academic Session 2024-25 is as under: -

1. Commencement of Phase II of CSAS

After the declaration of results of the Common University Entrance Test (CUET)-UG by the National Testing Agency, the University announces the commencement of Phase-II of Common Seat Allocation System (UG)-2024 (CSAS-UG) from **Thursday, August 01, 2024.**

In this phase, the candidates who had successfully completed the Phase-I must login to their dashboard (<https://ugadmission.uod.ac.in>) to choose their preferred Programs and college combination, subject to fulfillment of the eligibility criteria.

Candidates who have still not registered themselves on the CSAS portal will also be able to register as the University has decided to keep both the phases open till **04:59p.m. Wednesday, August 07, 2024.** Phase-I and Phase-II will close at **04:59p.m. Wednesday, August 07, 2024** and the preferences saved/submitted by the candidate will get auto-locked on reaching the deadline of **05:00 pm Friday, August 09, 2024.**

2. Calculation of Program-Specific merit score

In Phase-II, the Candidates will have to map the subjects studied by them in Class XII to those in which they have appeared in CUET-2024. Only those CUET Papers will be considered in which the candidates have passed his/her Class XII board exam. Candidates must refer to the Bulletin of Information for details related to similarity of the subjects. It will be the sole responsibility of the candidate to provide correct subject-mapping. The decision of university in this regard shall be final and binding.

Note: General Test of CUET(UG)-2024 will not be mapped to any subject.



The Non-Collegiate Women Education Board (NCWEB), Kalindi College Teaching Center, is one of the oldest among the twenty-six Centers of NCWEB, University of Delhi. The Center operates in a semi-regular mode in accordance with the rules and regulations prescribed by the NCWEB. Since 2022, NCWEB has also implemented the National Education Policy, and all UG courses are the same as the regular colleges of the university.

B.A. Programme and B.Com Programme are the two courses offered by the Centre. Only female candidates residing in the National Capital Territory of Delhi (with residential evidence of Aadhar Card/Voter Card/Passport) can enrol as students. The admission is done on the basis of merit, with cut-offs determined by the NCWEB, University of Delhi. The teaching classes are held on Sundays. A minimum attendance of 66% is required to appear in the end-semester University Examinations, which are held simultaneously with regular college. In addition, library facilities for undergraduate students are available at the center. The Center also organizes workshops, seminars, lectures, and extra-curricular activities for the holistic development of students.

COMMITTEE FOR COACHING AND REMEDIAL CLASSES

Kalindi College continuously strives to provide all possible assistance to students. For this purpose, the college has created an excellent committee and infrastructure to offer academic and co-curricular activities on campus. The college gives utmost importance to facilitating career counselling,

placement, and other professional assistance for young and aspiring students. Kalindi College organizes free remedial classes for students who need help in their academic sessions to perform well. The main objective is to improve their understanding of their discipline subjects and to help and guide them in their studies. The remedial timetable for each academic year is prepared in coordination with the various departments of the college. The cell is instrumental in ensuring that the required teachers conduct classes for the benefit of weaker students. Many students have benefited from this initiative.

In February 2012, the college started coaching classes for its registered SC/ST/OBC (excluding the creamy layer) and minority students under the Merged Scheme of the XI Plan, UGC. These classes were attended by enthusiastic students from these backgrounds who had a keen interest in learning. Students have benefited from professional expert coaching in different fields. In addition to coaching classes, they are provided with study materials, such as books, computer facilities, newspapers, competitive magazines, and online resource materials. Faculty members of the college and experts from outside are engaged as coordinators/instructors. The main focus of the resource person and committee is to help students improve their areas of difficulty so that they are better prepared for different competitive exams.

Gender Sensitization and Gender Justice are the pillars of any strong institution. Keeping this in mind, Kalindi College strives to provide a safe and secure ambience to its students, faculty and staff members where they can thrive. The Internal Committee (IC), formerly known as the Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) of Kalindi College, facilitates such a vision and has the necessary mechanisms in place to address complaints of sexual harassment swiftly and diligently. The Internal Committee deals with cases of sexual harassment on college premises. The Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace

(Prevention, Prohibition, and Redressal) Act, 2013, provides protection against sexual harassment of women at the workplace and for the prevention and Redressal of complaints of sexual harassment.

The XV-D ordinance is based on the Policy against Sexual Harassment by Delhi University and seeks to maintain and create an academic and work environment free of sexual harassment for students, academic and non-teaching staff of the Delhi University.

IC consists of the following members:

- (a) One Presiding Officer who shall be a senior faculty member
- (b) Two Members from amongst the Teaching Staff
- (c) One member from amongst non-governmental organization or legal firm familiar with issues relating to sexual harassment:
- (d) Two non-teaching staff members
- (e) Three elected student representatives

What Constitutes Sexual Harassment?

Any of the following (directly or by implication) shall mean sexual harassment:

- physical contact and advances
- a demand or request for sexual favours
- making sexually coloured remarks
- showing pornography
- any other unwelcome physical, verbal or non- verbal conduct of sexual nature.

Procedure to Constitute and File a Complaint

- **Write Down the Incident:** Clearly describe the incident(s) in detail. Include dates, times, locations, and the names of those involved. Be specific and clear.
- **Specify the Nature of Harassment:** Describe how the behaviour constitutes sexual harassment as per your organization's policy.
- **Include Evidence:** Attach any evidence you have collected to support your complaint.
- **Format:** The complaint should generally be in writing addressed to the Presiding Officer, Internal Committee. Ensure your complaint is signed and dated.
- **Time:** Complaint can be filed within three months of the incident of sexual harassment.
- False complaints can invite penalties.

ANTI-RAGGING COMMITTEE

‘Ragging’ means the doing of any act which causes, or is likely to cause any physical, psychological or physiological harm of apprehension or shame or embarrassment to a student, and includes,

(a) Teasing or abusing or playing practical jokes on, or causing hurt to any student.

(b) Asking any student to do any act, or perform anything, which she/he would not, in the ordinary course, be willing to do or perform.

Ragging is different from other crimes because the motive is solely to get perverse pleasure. Ragging is also different from other crimes as it is actively promoted by certain sections of the society.

Observation and Directives of the Supreme Court:

The Supreme Court of India has observed that enrolment in academic pursuits or a campus life should not immunize any adult citizen from the penal provisions of the laws of the land.

According to the directions of the Supreme Court, if any instance of ragging is brought to the notice of the administration or the faculty, it is legally binding on the institute to report the matter to the Local Police.

Anti-Ragging

Based on the directions of the Hon’ble Supreme Court, the UGC framed the “UGC Regulations on curbing the menace of ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009”. In compliance with the said Anti-ragging regulations, ragging is totally prohibited in Kalindi College, inside and / or outside the campus. Anyone indulging in the act of ragging and / or its abutment, whether actively or passively, or being a part of conspiracy to promote ragging, shall be liable to be prosecuted and punished as per mandate of UGC Regulations 2009 as well as under the provisions of any other penal law for the time being in force. Kalindi College strictly ensures that a congenial and welcoming environment is given to the freshers. To achieve this objective, an Anti-Ragging Committee has been formed by the Institute as per UGC Regulation 2009.

Roles and Responsibilities of Anti-Ragging Committee

- Zero tolerance to any act associated with ragging and to ensure strict compliance with the provision of UGC regulation 2009 at Kalindi College.
- Monitor and oversee the performance of the Anti-ragging squad to prevent ragging in Kalindi College.

Kalindi College has taken several steps to stop ragging inside college premises. During Orientation Programme, all the freshers are well informed about ragging as well as stern punitive penal action

against the individual involved in the act of ragging. Freshers are also informed about contact numbers and e-mail ids of Anti-Ragging Committee members to report any ragging activity in the college. Anti-ragging committee forms Anti-ragging squad of teachers to control ragging activities in the college. Several strict decisions have been taken to curb this offence. The students involved in ragging shall be prosecuted/ rusticated or even expelled for a specific term as per decision of the Principal. Several Notice Boards have been fixed in the college at prominent places stating provisions pertaining to anti-ragging laws as mandated by the ordinance XV-C. Any student can contact the Anti-Ragging Committee in case of any untoward incident.

ATTENDANCE COMMITTEE

The Attendance Committee of the college comprises of faculty members from different streams. This Committee regularly holds meetings and interacts with the administration office to ensure that proper and timely steps are taken in order to uphold the ordinances and guidelines laid down by University of Delhi from time to time, with respect to attendance of the students. The Committee also coordinates with the Teachers in-charge of various departments so that the department prepares a list of students having short attendance and arranges for letters to be sent for intimation to the parents/guardians.

Important Rules: -

- Medical certificates shall be excluded while calculating credit towards marks to be awarded for attendance though such certificates shall continue to be considered for the purpose of calculating eligibility to appear in the examination.
- A student shall be required to attend two thirds of total number of lectures/ Practicals / tutorials/ presentations separately delivered, to be eligible to appear in the examination.
- A student who will not fulfil required conditions of attendance as mentioned above in all the subjects taken together but has attended not less than 40% of lectures/ presentations/ tutorials/ practicals during the respective semester, may at the discretion of the principal appear for ensuing semester examination. Such student shall be required to make up for the deficiency in the next semester.
- In case a student is selected to participate in NCC camps/ Civil defence work/ NSS public assignments/sports or other curricular activities or represents college at various forums, the

numbers of lectures delivered during the period of absence shall be calculated as ‘deemed to have been attended’ only if forwarded by the concerned teacher.

The vision of the eco-club is to foster a sustainable and environmentally conscious community and ignite young minds to adopt green and eco-friendly practices, making a positive impact on the environment and promoting sustainable practices. The motto of the club is "There is no life without Nature". Meetings are held regularly, once a week in which various environment conservation activities, campaigns, and initiatives are planned. The mission of the eco-club is to create awareness about environmental issues, encourage eco-friendly habits, and implement initiatives that contribute to a greener campus and community.

The eco-club with the garden committee and IQAC Kalindi College organized an awareness campaign and a seminar on the topic: "*Physics, Parali or Diwali*" on 09th November 2023 which aims at spreading awareness about the harmful effects caused by the burning of Parali which led to emit various air pollutants in Delhi. Recently it is added as a 'VAC' subject in the college for the first four semester. Lt. Dr. Arti Singh is the Associate NCC Officer, the main key functionary of NCC in college, who is responsible to plan and organize training with the assistance of the permanent instructional (PI) staff, detailed by the NCC unit (Kirti Nagar). These years, Kalindi College NCC achieved various milestones which includes armed force recommendation. Overview

The XII Plan guidelines (2012-2017) of UGC for Persons with Disability Scheme in Colleges broadly posit two schemes in place, namely; 'Higher Education for Persons with Special Needs' (HEPSN) Scheme and Visually Challenged Teachers respectively. As per HEPSN Scheme, one of the key components has been the establishment of Enabling Unit for differently abled students in university colleges with a vision to raise awareness in higher education system about the special educational needs and other general issues pertaining to their learning. It also provides necessary guidance/ counselling for individuals with disabilities regarding courses to be chosen along with assisting them to gain successful employment in public and private sectors, at a later stage.

In the light of fruitful compliance of these UGC norms, Kalindi college is fully resolved and devoted to make concerted efforts for benefiting disabled students in the best possible way through effective functioning of such enabling Unit known as Equal Opportunity Cell (EOC). The EOC of Kalindi College is a platform to ensure that all especially abled students are bestowed with equal educational opportunities particularly visually impaired, hearing/ speech impaired, students with locomotor disability etc. Although there are only 7 differently abled students enrolled in totality, but despite

their low strength, this cell of Kalindi College is firmly committed to provide an accessible, conducive and supportive environment for persons with different abilities (Divyangjan).

Functions of the Unit

The concerned disability unit of the college facilitates admission of as many differently abled students as possible in various courses through open quota and also through their reservation. The cell organizes disability awareness programmes i.e. seminars, talks, celebrating disability-oriented days; World Disabled Day and White-cane Day, and other co-academic activities from time to time to disseminate knowledge among students about the challenges vis-a-vis disabled and prospects for them. It acquaints them about government academic and financial plans, scholarship schemes, job opportunities and other facilities offered by the college in detail. In order to make the college campus barrier-free and academic learning more disabled-friendly, several initiatives have been taken such as constructing ramps and hand rails in college buildings and library, arrangement of wheel-chairs for easy mobility of these students throughout college spaces and procurement of assistive technology of screen-reading software; JAWS for generating a sense of independence among visually impaired students while studying with the help of computers.

As per the new guidelines issued by university, complete waiver of fees for such students has been implemented. In a nutshell, this committee attempts to stimulate an overall personality development of disabled students, thereby bringing about their academic as well as co-academic empowerment.

The committee also displays banners and posters in the college premises to educate people about the dangers of tobacco consumption. Moreover, the committee has taken up the responsibility of monitoring the college premises to ensure that no one is smoking or using tobacco products on campus. Kalindi College takes pride in the fact that our college campus is a smoke-free campus.

In terms of Cigarettes and other Tobacco Products (Prohibition of Advertisement and Regulation of Trade and Commerce, Production, Supply and Distribution) Act, 2003, it is mandatory for the College to display and exhibit boards at conspicuous places outside the college premises stating that sale of cigarettes and other Tobacco Products in an area within a radius of 100 yards of the educational institution is strictly prohibited and that it is an offence punishable under section 24 of the Act. Also, it is mandatory for the College to display and exhibit boards at conspicuous places inside the college premises prominently stating that Kalindi College is a “No Tobacco Zone” for students and staff and strict action shall be taken whosoever is found to be indulged in activities related to violation of “No Tobacco Zone”. The college is strictly adhering to above said mandates.

Though, students of Kalindi College are averse to the use of tobacco, however the Anti-tobacco committee is not leaving any stone unturned to sensitize our students about the ill effects of tobacco, as the toxic chemicals in tobacco harms almost every part of our body and thereby increases risks of many diseases. Various programs are being organized to sensitize students about the detrimental effects upon health by use of Tobacco and by way of said programs to elaborate the negative side effect of nicotine use that corrupts every aspect of a person's health and his well-being as a whole.

LIBRARY

The college has a well-stocked library. It has a collection of over 89,338 books on different disciplines that students may issue to help them excel in their field of study. We have a wide array of books to choose from. The Library collection is divided into three sections, i.e. General, Textbook, and Reference Sections. Students may also refer to the large number of national and international journals that the library subscribes to. At present the library is subscribing 83 magazines/journals and 13 newspapers in English and Hindi languages. The library with its open rack system, spacious reading room and reference section provides an atmosphere conducive to study. A competent and friendly library staff guides and counsels the students regarding books and the library facilities. Students are encouraged to become regular and responsible users of the library. Photostat facility has been provided in the library, which is equally accessible to both teachers and students. On the first floor of the library, web centre is for accessing E-resources available through N-LIST and DELNET (Developing Library Network), DU E-library for the students and faculty members. Students can access N-LIST, DU E library and DELNET through remote login access also. The User Id and Password is given by the library.

Under the Green initiative, the library procures recycled material in lieu of library waste paper. Facility of E books to Print Disabled student is provided through DU Braille library and screen reading software i.e. NVDA is available in the library.

LIBRARY MEMBERSHIP

To become member of the library, students are required to fill membership form available in the library and attach three latest photo (02 passport size and 01 stamp size). After filling the form, they can collect their library membership card on the date given by the library.

CYBER CENTRE

The well managed cyber centre provide computer and internet accessibility to students, faculty and staff for various academic and administrative tasks. It also helps in facilitating the research work of faculty and students. In addition to these, 21 more databases are also accessible through Digital Library Consortium. Open access e-resources are also available through this campus wide network.

It has 2 Servers and 90 computers. It houses a UGC resource network centre which has 8 computers.

Teacher's Cyber Centre: In order to promote academic and research activities, the college has set up an exclusive cyber centre for the teachers, adjoining the Student's Cyber Centre, with 35 computers, all connected through LAN and Internet.

3. Bachelor of (field of Study) (Honours) Discipline (for single core discipline COURSE OF STUDY) after successful completion of Semester VI. Mandatory credits to be secured for the award 132.
4. Bachelor of (field of Multidisciplinary courses of Study) (for multiple core completion of disciplines courses of study). After successful completion of Semester VI. Mandatory credits to be secured for the award 132.
5. Bachelor of (Field of Study/ Discipline) (Honours with Research / Academic completion of Projects/Entrepreneurship) Discipline (for single core discipline course of study) after successful completion of semester VIII. Mandatory credits to be secured for the award 176.
6. Bachelor of (field of Multidisciplinary courses of Study) (Honours). After successful completion of semester VIII. Mandatory credits to be secured for the award 176.

- Classes per week: 3 or 4 (according to credits)
- Before the commencement of each semester, students select the VAC paper of their choice via a Google form shared by mail.

(Honours) course in Botany in 2013 under Four Year Undergraduate Programme. However, the University reverted back to B.Sc. (Programme) semester mode in 2014. B.Sc. (Honours) Botany was again introduced in the year 2017. Presently the Department is running Undergraduate courses of B.Sc (H) Botany & B.Sc (Prog.) Life Science.

(2) Scope of the Course: Botany is emerging as one of the potential areas for career and research within the country and abroad. Aspirants having B.Sc. (H) Botany can find a lot of career opportunities in both public sector and private sector. They can join Botanical Survey of India (BSI), National Institute of Oceanography (NIO), Indian Agricultural Research Institute (IARI), Indian Council of Forestry Research and Education (ICFRE) etc. as a Research Associate. Graduates of this subject can opt for post-graduation in Life-Science, Biotechnology, Biochemistry, Toxicology, Genetics, Molecular Biology, Microbiology, etc. Applied Post-Graduate courses in Environmental Sciences, Agro Forestry, and Forensic Science can also be pursued.

DEPARTMENT OF GEOGRAPHY

1. Introduction of Department:

The Department of Geography was established in 1995, under the BA (Programme) Course. In order to broaden the horizon of understanding about Geographical Studies, the College started B.A. (Honors) course in Geography in 2017 under the CBCS mode. The Department of Geography has always been committed towards excellence. Along with the theoretical framework, the department has established a well-equipped Cartography laboratory and GIS Lab for students to learn and enhance their skills through practical applications in the fields of Cartography, Remote Sensing, GIS and GPS. The Department of Geography has prepared 3-D and 2-D maps of the College which help the students and commuters to get the location of teaching and non-teaching places within the college campus.

The department conducts the annual Geo Fest- Resurgence in which students and experts from various universities and colleges participate in academic deliberations to enhance academic interaction. The society has its own e-magazine “GEOSOPHY” which is edited and maintained by its executive members.

The Department of Geography runs a certificate course on Travel & Tourism with the objective of educating, training and developing the much-needed skills to prepare students who join the travel and tourism industry, and are valuable in providing them with alternative career opportunities.

The Department of Geography is looking after the functioning of the Paper Recycle Unit installed in our college campus. As a matter of fact, this unit utilizes the waste paper accumulated from various departments as raw material and prepares recycled paper which can be used for various purposes.

To cater to the needs of students, the Geography Department has a well-equipped laboratory for conducting practical classes, which are managed by experienced and capable staff. In addition to laboratory, the department has a good collection of books in Departmental Library.

- i. **Cartography Lab:** has a Tracing Table, LCD Projector, maps, models and charts.
- II. **GIS Lab:** equipped with computers, GPS, Stereoscopes, Rotameter and Planimeter and LCD Projector. The lab is well-enabled with satellite imageries, aerial photographs as well as various simulation programs related to various practicals.

- III. **Departmental Library:** The Department has its own library with a good collection of books on Geography, Practical notes and Projects. The books available in the library are also issued to students.
- IV. **Store Room:** The Department also has a separate store room that is issued for the storage of maps, charts as well as instruments and equipments.

2. Scope of the Subject:

The Scope of the Course covers the fields such as Geomorphology, Cartographic Techniques, Human Geography, Thematic Cartography, Climatology, Statistical Methods in Geography, Geography of India, Economic Geography, Environmental Geography, Field Work and Research Methodology, Regional Planning and Development, Remote Sensing and GIS, Evolution of Geographical Thought and Disaster Management based Project Work. The career prospects of this course lie in the Survey of India, Space application centre, Urban and rural development departments, Metropolitan development corporation, and Social and environmental research organizations. DEPARTMENT OF SANSKRIT

(1) Brief introduction about the Department:

The department of Sanskrit was introduced to the college in 1967 offering B.A pass course & the B.A. (H) & M.A Sanskrit in 1973. In 2016, the paper of Buddhist Studies introduced as B.A program course in Sanskrit Department with the aim to develop the keen interest & aware the students about the diversity of Sanskrit language. The Faculty not only just focuses on the study of Sanskrit language but also represents the richness of Indian Culture, Ethical Values & Vedic Mathematics. Various papers have been introduced for better career opportunities for students such as: Indian Ontology and Epistemology, Aesthetics and Indian Theatre, Sanskrit media, Computer Awareness, Basic Elements of Ayurveda, Acting and Script Writing etc. The teachers give stress on the overall development of students & laid emphasis on the fluency of speaking the language. In this aspect, Sanskrit Sahitya Parishad actively organizes various National and International seminars, talks and Sanskrit Sambhashan Shivir to develop communication skills. Our Sanskrit Sahitya Parishad organises many activities on a regular basis to provide common platform to students to showcase their talent so that they can develop confidence and get the opportunity so that they can lead to the positive environment in all streams of knowledge. Our department has always been honored with Sanskrit scholars and today we are following their path.

(2) Scope of the Course:

Sanskrit is the mother of all languages. About 97% of all world languages have been directly or indirectly influenced by this language. Sanskrit has the highest number of words (102 Arab, 78 Crore and 50 Lac words) in its vocabulary, which is much greater than other languages in the world. The scope of Sanskrit will be more in computers and technology in the near future. The students who opt for Sanskrit find various career opportunities in different research-oriented fields & can also choose to work in L.I.C. and other financial institutions, academic and other administrative posts in Ideological/ Sanskrit/ Oriental Research Institutions. Options of teaching such as professors, lecturers and school teachers in Sanskrit is the most likely career opportunities for students. The course relates to different historical backgrounds of Sanskrit-based literature. After graduating in Sanskrit, students can also opt for bank jobs, become translators, work in museums, libraries, become newsreaders and even go for civil services. Library science, water conservation, archaeology, environmental science and media are becoming the preferred choices of Sanskrit students nowadays.

DEPARTMENT OF ZOOLOGY

(1) Brief introduction about the Department:

The Department of Zoology started in 1967 since the inception of college. This Department has been working as an integral part from the very beginning of various courses in the college that come under Bachelor of Science in General and/ or Life Sciences streams. This Department has remained engaged actively in the successful journey of these programs and has started B.Sc. (H) Zoology since 2017-18, after erstwhile FYUP in Zoology.

Zoology is the study of animals wherein the student receives a highly comprehensive exposure to all levels of animal function and their diversity. As a subject it creates enormous interest in us as we are also part of the animal kingdom. Thus, understanding the development and evolution of animals helps us to explore ourselves better. In this stream, students delve at a deeper level about how animals are an integral component of the ecosystem. Animals also have a major impact on our economy either as pests competing for our food or as parasites influencing the quality of public health.

The knowledge of animal forms and their physiological function opens the gateway to applications in a number of exciting and innovative fields. In recent years, the study of both fundamental and applied Zoology has induced a keen interest in students, researchers and animal science-based industries. These subjects have been able to grab the attention of the academic world and have motivated scientists to work towards biodiversity conservation, formulating ecological safeguards and to apply Biotechnology and Bioinformatics to the field of Biomedical and Pharmaceutical sciences.

The Department has played an active role in consistently producing the University positions in Life Sciences (a student of B. Sc. Life Sciences "*Jasmine Jaggarwal*" holds 1st position in Life Science (99.3%) in the history of the University, for the academic year 2013-2014 and also experiencing the consecutive successes in B.Sc. (H) Zoology. Our students routinely get University ranks showing that they have the mettle and, given the right motivation and prospects, can move to greater heights. They are also conferred with the scholarships for good academic records at college level. The students of Life Sciences and Zoology have been the proud recipients of these awards every year.

To acquaint the students with a sound base of scientific training, the Department organizes various visits and excursions to important sites and scientific institutions. This helps them to inculcate

a scientific and innovative temperament and acquire new concepts of relevant technologies in Zoology.

Apart from this, the Department is regularly involved in co-curricular and extracurricular activities under the interdepartmental society called the “**Biochemical Society**” and the Department Society “**Zoonomia**”. These societies are functional throughout the year wherein students and faculty members regularly participate in the activities with great enthusiasm.

The faculty members of the Department are well qualified with extensive teaching/research experience. Therefore, the department has an environment of academicians and research fellows who provide the students a foundation to nurture their future scientific endeavours. Most of the members are currently engaged in projects under In-house, UGC, DST and DBT schemes.

To cater to the need for grooming students towards science, the Zoology Department has a well-equipped laboratory for conducting practical classes which are managed by experienced and capable staff. In addition to the laboratory, the Department has a well-maintained Museum with a diverse range of specimens and a good collection of books in the Departmental Library. The Department takes steps to devote more of their resources to research, education and conservation than the conventional approach of academics. In the view of conservation, the Department of Zoology has conceptualized and established a “**Butterfly Conservatory**” and an “**Aquatic Ecosystem**” in the College premises. The Department joined the campaign of “**Campus Bird Count India**” in previous years and also organizes “**Educational Excursion**” as part of the curriculum.

(2) Scope of the Course:

After completing Bachelors in Zoology, a large number of higher education avenues open up for the students as they are eligible for:

- i. **Master of Science Degree** in Zoology, Biochemistry, Biotechnology, Environmental Sciences, Forestry, Microbiology, Genetics, Wildlife and various fields of Conservatory Sciences, Health Sciences, etc.
- ii. **Research Training and Ph.D.** - A student of Zoology can pursue research training and Ph.D. at renowned National and International Institutions.
- iii. **Post-Doctoral Fellowships**- a large number of students also go in for research as Post- Doctoral Fellows in various Universities and Institutes all over the world.
- iv. **Assistant Professorships**- in various Colleges or University Departments after completion of Ph. D.

- v. **Teachers-** after completing Masters in Zoology followed by Bachelor Degree in Education (B. Ed).
- vi. **Scientists-** various funding agencies especially UGC, DST and DBT offers a number of Women's Scientist positions, particularly aimed at motivating more women to take up research positions.
- vii. **Indian Administrative and Indian Forest services-** a graduate student may seek their career in Indian Administration Services as a Civil Servant and Forest Officer after qualifying civil service examination with Zoology as main subject.
- viii. **Jobs/Services:** A Zoologist is also in demand in agriculture, fisheries and other industries related to animal husbandry. They can also opt for areas like veterinary sciences, pharmaceuticals, technical and/or research assistance in laboratories, museums, scientific organizations and scientific journalism. They also have other non-science options open to them like pursuing management, marketing and sales etc.

PROCTORIAL BOARD

Convenor: Ms Anshu Chotani

Co-Convenor: Dr Rajni Kanwar

The Proctorial Board is concerned with maintaining discipline in the college. Its actions are governed by Ordinance XV-B of the University of Delhi. The College expects its students to uphold the dignity of the institution and act in an exemplary manner. Every student, in addition to the provisions laid out in the aforementioned Ordinance, shall abide by the rules of the college and be a law-abiding citizen of the country.

ORDINANCE XV-B

Maintenance of Discipline among Students of the University

- (1) All powers relating to discipline and disciplinary action are vested in the Vice-Chancellor.
- (2) The Vice-Chancellor may delegate all or such powers as he/she deems proper to the Proctor and to such other persons as he/she may specify in this behalf.
- (3) Without prejudice to the generally power to enforce discipline under the Ordinance. The following shall amount to acts of gross indiscipline.
 - (i) Physical assault or threat to use physical force, against any member of the teaching and non-teaching staff of any Institution/Department and against any student within the University of Delhi.
 - (ii) Carrying of, use of, or threat to use of weapons.
 - (iii) Any violation of the provisions of the Civil Rights Protection Act, 1976.
 - (iv) Violation of the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the scheduled castes and tribes:
 - (v) Any practice-whether verbal or otherwise-derogatory of women.
 - (vi) Any attempt at bribing or corruption in any manner.
 - (vii) Wilful destruction of institutional property.
 - (viii) Creating ill-will or intolerance on religious or communal grounds.
 - (ix) Causing disruption in any manner of the academic functioning of the University system.

- (x) Ragging as per ordinance XV-C.
- (4) Maintenance of discipline and taking such action in the interest of maintaining discipline as may seem him/her appropriate, the Vice-Chancellor, may in the exercise of his/her powers aforesaid order or direct that any students or students
- (i) Be expelled: or
 - (ii) Be, for a stated period rusticated: or
 - (iii) Be not for a stated period, admitted to a course or courses of study in a College,
- (5) Department or Institution of the University: or
- (i) Be fined with a sum of rupees that may be specified: or
 - (ii) Be debarred from taking a University or College or Departmental Examination or Examinations for one or more years: or
 - (iii) That the result of the students or students concerned in the Examination or Examinations in which he/she or they have appeared be cancelled.
- (6) The Principals of the Colleges, Heads of the Halls, Dean of Faculties, Heads of Teaching Departments in the University, the Principal, School of Correspondence Courses and Continuing Education and Librarian shall have the authority to exercise all such disciplinary powers over students in their respective Colleges, Institutions, Faculties and Teaching Departments, in the University as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the Institutions, Halls and teaching in the concerned Departments. They may exercise their authority through or delegate authority to, such of teachers in their Colleges, Institutions or Departments as they may specify for these purposes.
- (7) Without prejudice to the powers of the Vice-Chancellor and the Proctor as aforesaid, detailed rules of discipline and proper conduct shall be framed. These rules may be supplemented, where necessary, by the Principals of Colleges, Heads of Halls, Deans of Faculties and Heads of Teaching Departments in this University. Each student shall be expected to provide himself/herself with a copy of these rules.
- (8) At the time of admission, every student shall be required to sign a declaration that on admission he/she submits himself/herself to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the Vice-Chancellor and the several authorities of the University who may be vested with the authority to exercise discipline.

COLLEGE RULES & REGULATIONS

The College expects its students to conduct themselves in a disciplined and dignified manner in the College.

Some provisions are as follows:

1. Students are responsible for their conduct to the Principal and are prohibited from doing anything, either inside or outside the College that will amount to a breach of discipline or interference in the College. A student will be liable to disciplinary action for violation of any of the rules of discipline. Disciplinary action may involve warning, and / or fine, and / or suspension from use of the College library or even from the College, or any such action as provided for in Ordinance XV (B) and XV(C) of the Rules of Discipline of the University of Delhi.
2. No Society can be formed in the College nor shall any person be invited to address a meeting in the College without the prior permission of the Principal.
3. Students shall leave their bicycles, scooters or motorcycles, cars locked in the parking area at their own risk. No bicycle, scooters or motorcycles shall be parked in any other part of the College building.
4. No student can invite any outsider / police or any other unauthorised person in the college without prior/ written permission of the Principal.
5. Every student shall submit herself to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the Vice-Chancellor, several authorities of the University and Kalindi College, who may be vested with the authority to exercise discipline under the Acts, the Statutes, the Ordinances and the Rules that have been framed by the University and the College authorities.
6. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited within the College premises or any other part of Delhi University as well as in public transport. Abetment of ragging will also amount to ragging. Any individual or collective act or practice of ragging constitutes gross indiscipline and shall be dealt with under Ordinance XV(C).
7. As per the Hon'ble Supreme Court's order, smoking is strictly prohibited inside the College campus. Delhi University is partnering with Delhi Police and World Lung Foundation-South Asia to promote a tobacco free environment. As a step in that direction, smoking is banned in Kalindi College.

On admission, every student to the college is required to sign a declaration that she submits herself to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the Vice-Chancellor and the personnel of the University and the College who may be vested with the authority to exercise discipline under the Acts, Statutes, Ordinances and Rules of the University / College.

ORDINANCES

The student of the College is required to maintain discipline and good conduct in and outside the College. Violation of discipline rules and acts of ragging, sexual harassment etc. are punishable according to the following University Ordinances

1. Ordinance VII – Rules of Attendance
2. Ordinance XV- B – Discipline
3. Ordinance XV- C – Anti-ragging
4. Ordinance XV- D – Sexual harassment

Ragging is strictly prohibited and will result in suspension from the College. Any ragging incident may be reported to the Students' Union, Faculty advisors or Principal. The Honourable Supreme Court has issued guidelines for such matters which the College will adhere to. These Ordinances are available on the University website and the students are required to read them carefully.

Ordinance XV- C

Anti-ragging

1. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited, within the premises of College/Department or Institution and any part of Delhi University system as well as on public transport.
2. Any individual or collective act or practice of ragging constitutes gross indiscipline and shall be dealt with under this Ordinance.
3. Ragging for the purposes of this Ordinance, ordinarily means any act, conduct or practice by which dominant power or status of senior students is brought to bear on students freshly enrolled or students who are in any way considered junior or inferior by other students; and includes individual or collective acts or practices which –
 - a. Physical assault or threat to use of physical force
 - b. Violate the status, dignity and honour of women students
 - c. Violate the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the scheduled caste and tribe
 - d. Expose students to ridicule and contempt and affect their self-esteem
 - e. Entail verbal abuse and aggression, indecent gestures and obscene behaviour.
5. The Principal of a College, the Head of the Department or an Institution, the authorities of College, or University Hostel or Halls of Residence shall take immediate action on any information of the occurrence of ragging.

6. Notwithstanding anything in Clause (4) above, the Proctor may also sometime enquire into any incident of ragging and make a report to the Vice-Chancellor of the identity of those who have engaged in ragging and the nature of the incident.
7. The Proctor may also submit an initial report establishing the identity of the perpetrators of ragging and the nature of the ragging incident.
8. If the Principal of a College or Head of the Department or Institution or the Proctor is satisfied that for some reason, to be recorded in writing, it is not reasonably practical to hold such an enquiry, he/she may so advise the Vice-Chancellor accordingly.
9. When the Vice-Chancellor is satisfied that it is not expedient to hold such an enquiry, his/her decision shall be final.
10. On the receipt of a report under Clause (5) or (6) or a determination by the relevant authority under clause (7) disclosing the occurrence of ragging incidents described in Clause 3(a), (b) and (c), the Vice-Chancellor shall direct or order rustication of a student or students for a specific number of years.
11. The Vice-chancellor may in other cases of ragging order or direct that any student or students be expelled or be not for a stated period, admitted to a course of study in a college, departmental examination for one or more years or that the results of the student or students concerned in the examination or examinations in which they appeared be cancelled.
12. In case any students who have obtained degrees or diplomas of Delhi University are found guilty; under this Ordinance, appropriate action will be taken under Statute 15 for withdrawal of degrees or diploma conferred by the University.
13. For the purpose of this Ordinance, abetment to ragging whether by way of any act, practice or incitement of ragging will also amount to ragging.
14. All Institutions within the Delhi University system shall be obligated to carry out instructions/ directions issued under this Ordinance, and to give aid assistance to the Vice-Chancellor to achieve the effective implementation of the Ordinance.

Note: Order of the Vice-Chancellor in pursuance of Ordinance XV-C: Where incident(s) of ragging are reported to the Vice-Chancellor by any authority under this Ordinance, the students(s) involved in ragging, shall be expelled for a specified term, designated in the order. Non-students involved in reports of ragging will be proceeded with under the criminal law of India; they will also be rendered ineligible for a period of five years from seeking enrolment in any of the institutions of the University of Delhi. Students against whom necessary action is taken under this note, will be given post decisional hearing, with strict adherence to the rules of natural justice.

ORDINANCE XV-D**Sexual Harassment**

1. Short Title and Extent The present Ordinance is based on the Policy against Sexual Harassment by the Delhi University and seeks to maintain and create an academic and work environment free of sexual harassment for students, academic and non-teaching staff of the Delhi University. The Ordinance will also apply to outsiders and residents, on the Delhi University campus, to the extent specified herein these rules and procedures.
2. Definition :
 - I. “Students” includes regular students as well as current ex-students of Delhi University.
 - ii. “Teaching Staff” include any person on the staff of the Delhi University or any colleges or institution affiliated to it, who is appointed to a teaching and/or research post, whether full time, temporary, ad-hoc, part-time, visiting, honorary, or on special duty or deputation and shall also include employees employed on a casual or project basis.
 - iii. “Non-Teaching Staff” includes any person on the staff of the Delhi University or of any colleges or institutions affiliated to it, who is not included in the teaching staff. It includes employees who are full-time, temporary, ad-hoc, part-time, visiting, honorary, or on special duty or deputation, and employees employed on a casual or project basis.
 - iv. “Member of the University” includes all those included in categories (I)-(iii) above.
 - v. “Resident” includes any person who is a temporary or permanent resident of any of the accommodations or premises allotted to an employee by the University of Delhi or by any of its affiliated colleges or institutions.
 - vi. “Outsider” includes any person who is not a member of the University or a resident. It also includes, but is not limited to, any private person offering residential, food and other facilities to students, teaching staff or non- teaching staff of the Delhi University or any college or institution affiliated to Delhi University.
 - vii. “Campus” includes all places of work and residence in the Delhi University or any college or institution affiliated to the Delhi University. It includes all places of instruction, research and administration, as well as hostel, health centres, sports grounds, staff quarters and public places (including shopping centres, eating places, parks, streets and lanes) on the Delhi

University campus or the campus of any college or institution affiliated to the Delhi University.

- viii. “Sexual Harassment” includes any unwelcome sexually determined behaviour, whether directly or by implication and includes physical contact and advances, a demand or request for sexual favours, sexually-coloured remarks, showing pornography or any other unwelcome physical, verbal or non-verbal conduct of sexual nature. Explanation: “Sexual Harassment” shall include, but will not be confined to the following:
- a. When submission to unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favours, and verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature are made, either implicitly or explicitly, a ground for any decision relating to employment, academic performance, extracurricular activities, or entitlement to services or opportunities at the Delhi University.
 - b. When unwelcome sexual advances, and verbal, non-verbal and/or physical conduct such as loaded comments, remarks or jokes, letters, phone calls or e-mail, gestures, exhibition pornography, lurid stares, physical contact, stalking, sounds or display of a derogatory nature have the purpose and/or effect of interfering with an individual’s performance or of creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive environment.
 - c. When a person uses, with a sexual purpose, the body or any part of it or any object as an extension of the body in relating to another person without the latter’s consent or against the person’s will, such conduct will amount to sexual assault.
 - d. When deprecatory comments, conduct or any such behaviour is based on the gender identity/sexual orientation of the person and/or when the classroom or other public forum of the University is used to denigrate/discriminate against a person or create a hostile environment on the basis of a person’s gender identity/sexual orientation.
