Journalism Students from all three years were present along with the faculty members, Dr. Ahana Chopra, Dr. Bharti, Ms. Mamta, Dr. Praveen Gautam and Dr. Keshav Patel.

The session was conducted by Dr. Muskan Bhatnagar, a distinguished expert in Ecommerce and Cyber Research. The workshop took place at the Media Lab from 10:30 AM onwards, attracting a significant number of students eager to enhance their research skills.

Dr. Bhatnagar provided an indepth understanding of the fundamental concepts of variables and their role in media research.

She explained different types of variables: independent, dependent, control, and extraneous and their significance in media studies. Furthermore, she elaborated on various measurement scales, including nominal, ordinal, interval, and ratio scales, and how they are applied in media research.

Workshop: News, Narrative and Nari Shakti

Sahaafat— The Journalism Society of Kalindi College, University of Delhi, successfully hosted a seminar titled "News, Narrative and Nari Shakti" on 07.03.25 in the Seminar room (T5).

The event was held under the direction of Dr. Meena Charanda, Principal of Kalindi College; Dr. Manisha Tomar, Convenor and TIC, Department of Journalism; Dr. Aahana Chopra and Dr. Praveen Gautam, Convenors of the seminar; and Dr. Vinay Rai and Dr. Gyamar Nemey, student advisors. Journalism students from all three years were present along with the faculty members, Miss Mamta, Dr Bharti, and Dr Keshav Patel

The esteemed guest speakers Dr. Lipakshi Khurana, a Senior News anchor (DD news) Chandrika Joshi, a Renowned Newsreader (All India Radio), shared their insights on the evolving role of women in media narratives. Dr. Khurana highlighted how mainstream news often portrays women through a limited lens, either as victims or as symbols of resilience, rather than as multifaceted individuals shaping society. She emphasized the need for a shift in journalistic practices to ensure that women's voices are not only heard but also represented authentically in news discourse. On the other hand, Chandrika Joshi focused on the role of narratives in empowering women, stressing that storytelling has the power to break stereotypes and challenge patriarchal norms. She cited examples of how digital platforms have given women a space to share their stories, unfiltered and uncensored, leading to greater awareness and societal change.

discussion, During the students actively engaged with the speakers, sharing their perspectives on the role of media in shaping gender narratives. Many expressed concerns over the way women are often portrayed in news, either as victims of violence or as exceptions in male-dominated fields. rather than integral contributors to society. Some students pointed out how sensationalism in news reporting often overshadows the real issues women face, reducing their struggles to mere headlines instead of meaningful discourse.

And it's not just limited to singles, even couples have found a relationship expert in ChatGPT and are communicating every single issue to it than simply sharing it with their partners. While ChatGPT may provide you smart, actionable tips and solutions, it also parallelly feeds delusions and provides judgement on one-sided perspectives leading to a feedback loop of self-validation. Why is Gen Z confessing to a keyboard?


