Literature about the partition poses the question of what is at stake in the universalizing views of citizenship and 'Womanhood' invested in nationalist discourse. "As national emblems," argues Loomba (2014), 'women are usually cast as mothers or wives, and are called upon to literally and figuratively reproduce the nation (216). Woman as Mother of the nation is a common trope in Indian writing and, as the violence against women at the time of partition and after suggests, the

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protection, assault, abduction, and recovery of their bodies underscores how their figuration in nationalist discourse is key to understanding this history and its implications for the present.

Virginia Woolf: A Room of One's Own (1929)

May I remind you that there have been at least two colleges for women in existence in England since the year 1866; that after the year 1880 a married woman was allowed by law to possess her own property; and that in 1919which is a whole nine years ago - she was given a vote? May I also remind you that most of the professions have been open to you for close on ten years now? When you reflect upon these immense privileges and the length of time during which they have been enjoyed, and the fact that there must be at this moment some two thousand women capable of earning over five hundred a year in one way or another, you will agree that the excuse of lack of opportunity, training, encouragement, leisure and money no longer holds good You must, of course, go on bearing children, but, so they say, in twos and threes, not in tens and twelves. Thus, with some time on your hands and with some book learning in your brains......surely you should embark upon another stage of your very long, very laborious and highly obscure career.....Now my belief is that this poet who never wrote a word and was buried at the cross-roads still lives. She lives in you and in me, and in many other women who are not here to-night, for they are washing up the dishes and putting the children to bed.For my belief is that if we live another century or so... and have five hundred a year each of us and rooms of our own; if we have the habit of freedom and the courage to write exactly what we think; then the opportunity will come.
